Jerome Home Courtyard Garden Club: Lessons from our garden

May and June started our vegetable garden off with a bang. It was lush, healthy and thriving. It seemed that you could almost watch the plants grow right before your eyes. Then the drought and high temperatures took a toll and while still growing, it became a bit rough around the edges. However, we continued on and learned many things in our garden this season.

Our generous families and friends donated a variety of tomato plants, lettuces, cucumbers, herbs, eggplants, squash and even broccoli, a first for our garden. We give many thanks to you all; without your support we would not be able to continue what is a passion for many of us in the Garden Club. Our garden allows us to be outside in the sun, get our hands in the dirt, care for living things, see the progress throughout the season, continue learning, and best of all, enjoy the harvest.



An electric toothbrush in the garden, you ask? You may have observed our Garden Club in what seemed an odd behavior. No, we were not

trying to clean the tomato plants but rather to help the bees with the pollination. Tomato flowers have both male and female parts in each flower so it is easy to pollinate them by placing an electric toothbrush under an open flower; this vibration mimics that of a bee. Given the reduced population of bees in our world, this helps to ensure a more abundant crop. This is a tip we actually learned last season.

This year we learned about blossom end rot which is often caused by poor calcium uptake and can be affected by drought stress. Researching on the Internet, we found many suggestions for dealing with this problem including adding powdered lime to the soil before planting or bone meal, watering with a drip irrigation system and adding crumbled up eggshells to the soil which can help to maintain the calcium levels.

Garden season came to an end with a late harvest of beets, carrots and radishes that we planted in August. We also brought in Helen S.'s orange tree - which she started from a seed - to spend the winter in the nice warm sunshine of the second floor Attwood corridor. Who knows? Maybe in time we will even get some fruit. We look forward to learning new things and growing new crops.


